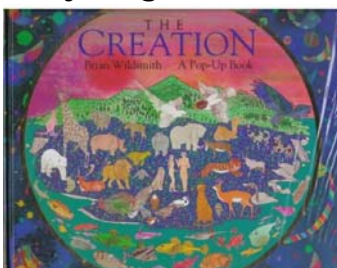

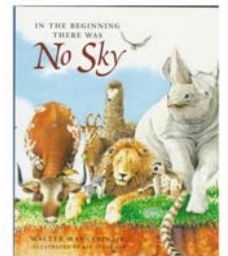

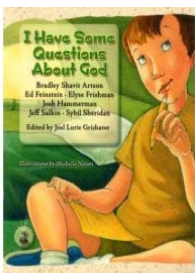
A parent tells a child a personalized version of how God created the

This book builds on the concepts developed in the book below, stressing mitzvot
 such as *tzedakah*, *limmud* Torah and Shabbat, and teaches how we honor our
 covenant and add to life's holiness. It presents role models from early Jewish
 history, including Isaiah and Rabbi Akiva, as well as modern heroes, such as
 Abraham Joshua Heschel and Golda Meir. (For grades 5 and 6)

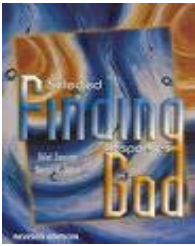

A collection of traditional and original Jewish tales interpreting the Biblical story of the creation of the world.

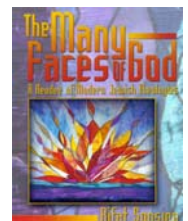
Uses Biblical inquiry (or guided discussion) as its main methodology and asks three main questions: (1) what does the text say? (2) What does the text mean? and (3) What does the text mean to me? Includes background material treating basic issues in Biblical history and thought.

Jewish Tradition and the Challenge of Darwinism. Edited by Geoffrey Cantor and Marc Swetlitz. University of Chicago Press, 2006.

Presents case studies showing how Jewish discussions of evolution have been shaped by the intersections of faith, science, philosophy, and ideology in specific historical contexts.

The Many Faces of God: A Reader of Modern Jewish Theologies by Rifat Sonsino. URJ Press, 2004.

The book contains essays by 15 twentieth-century scholars and theologians, representing Conservative, Reform, Reconstructionist and feminist viewpoints.

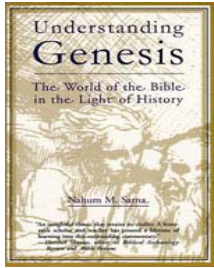
